stARTup Art Fair Los Angeles 2017 Wrap Up Report

The second edition of **stARTup Art Fair** Los Angeles ran from January 27- January 29, 2017. Over the course of three days, the contemporary art fair saw a steady stream of highly engaged and notable patrons who viewed work by 35 artists from all over the country, as well as exhibitions from five local Los Angeles non-profit cultural partners. Accomplishing its mission to serve independent artists, the fair gave its exhibitors the ability to present their work to both new and existing clients, gather incisive feedback about their art practice from a qualified audience, and facilitate connections for career advancement.

stARTup Art Fair Los Angeles returned to Hollywood's historic Highland Gardens Hotel which was transformed by exhibiting artists into a fun, relaxed and intimate contemporary art experience. Solo and collective exhibitions filled each hotel room, sculpture and video projections dotted the hotel's lush grounds and visitors passed between rooms conversing

directly with the artists about their work. Strong sales were made ranging from \$200 to \$10,000—with artists keeping 100% of the sales proceeds.

Many new connections were forged between artists and prospective industry professionals for exhibitions and future projects. As always, the fair organizers attribute the success of stARTup Art Fair to the talented and driven exhibiting artists, and are grateful to the enthusiastic visitors for supporting their vision in presenting independent artists to a savvy and culturally curious audience.

In addition to its core exhibiting artists, stARTup Art Fair Los Angeles featured curated rooms and special projects from local nonprofit partners 18th Street Arts Center, The Torrance Art Museum, PØST's Friction, a series of work that explores identity and politics of the individual and the collective, and a group showing by Los Angeles-based emerging artists, Andree Carter and Richard Gayler, curated by the Los Angeles Art Association. fair also hosted two full days of Art Conversations with notable panelists including: Max Presneill, Maurizzio Pineda Allison Wyper, Kristine Schomaker, Kio Griffith, Peter Mays Shana Nys Dambrot and Peter Frank
